I will be participating in the Northern Coast to Coast challenge on the 23rd June 2018, cycling from Seascale (Lake District coast) to Whitby (North Yorks coast) in a day. The route is 150 miles with 4500 metres of ascent taking in the infamous Hardknott and Wrynose passes amongst other 'slopes' on the way. It is an organised ride but I will be cycling solo and drafting anyone/anything I can get close to. Fingers crossed the wind is blowing in the right direction!

And now the serious bit: my son Austin (2.5 years old) was born with a very rare genetic syndrome (Cornelia de Lange Syndrome). Briefly, this has affected Austin with slow growth (6.5kg), physical and mental developmental delay and hearing loss amongst other equally serious issues. Despite all this he is a very cheeky chappy!

I would like to raise some money for the CDLS charity that provides support to children, adults and families affected by the syndrome. The charity is very small and run by volunteers; it receives no government funding and relies solely on donations. A large proportion of the money raised supports further research into the syndrome at Birmingham University and twice a year the Doctors/PHD students come (for free) to the CDLS conferences and present the latest research. It is likely that any money raised will have a positive impact on Austin's and other children's future as we learn more about the syndrome.





From The Hills

It was a hard winter, with deep drifts of snow and quite a few days of not being able to venture out by car. When spring came, the blossom in the farm orchard was wonderful; the air in the aisles between the trees heavy with the hum of bees. But now it is summer and I look in my nature diaries of previous years and see that this will be a time of successes and failures; of fledgling youngsters and moulting parents, the clock of far-off winter already ticking. My vegetable plot will be assaulted by voles and mice, rabbits, pigeons, slugs and snails. There may be a drought and the hard earth force moles to the surface, where they become disorientated by the brightness. There will be tumbles of pink dog roses; and poppies studding the fields of young wheat. The first hummingbird hawk moths will arrive on the red campion and garden stocks; the rough track up onto the common will be edged with honeysuckle and spears of willow herb reaching for the sky. The orchard will grow green and cool as a church and I will see comma butterflies and meadow browns in the dappled light. I may even come across a grass snake warming up in the early morning sun.

The first broods of swallows will swoop out of the barns and the air will be busy with chattering excitement. Looking up the valley from the orchard gate I will see the fields of wheat curling and whispering like the sea.

Withycombe Spring Flower Watch

Road verges really matter. They are home to over 700 species of wild flower - nearly 45% of our total UK flora - including 29 species of wild orchid. As other wild space disappears – 97% of meadows have vanished since the 1930s – they become even more important. And where wildflowers lead, nature follows. Red clover and lady's bedstraw - two particularly wildlife-friendly plants - are experiencing the most rapid declines. Bees, butterflies, birds, bats and bugs depend on our verges, as the wider countryside becomes increasingly hostile.

Kerrie Thorne and Anne Rivett on their pushchair walks up to Combe Farm have compiled the following provisional list of plants

that they have identified on Buckhill and Combe Lane in the last two weeks. What an amazing number of wild plants we have on our doorstep!

This is not a comprehensive list but it is a start! If you have any comments, additions, corrections or queries please talk to Kerrie or Anne. Next year they will start recording in early spring.

June 2018. Buckhill and Combe Lane plants recorded:

Angelica, alkanet

Bracken, burdock, bindweed, bramble, bedstraw (hedge), black bryony, buttercup (creeping)

Cowslip, cow parsley, clover (red and white), cranesbill (cut leaf and shining), cleavers, cat's ear

Dock sp, dog's mercury, dandelion, daisy

Enchanter's-nightshade

Forget-me-not, foxglove, fox-and-cubs, fumitory, figwort

Garlic mustard, germander speedwell

Hedge woundwort, herb-robert, hart's-tongue fern, hogweed, hemlock water-drop wort, hop, honeysuckle Ivy (common)

Meadow sweet, mare's-tail, mugwort, mouse-ear (common)

Nettle (common)

Oxeve daisy

Plantain (greater and ribwort), pignut

Red campion, ramsons

Stitchwort (lesser), sedge (pendulous), silverweed

Tufted vetch, traveller's joy, thistles (various, including creeping, spear and marsh)

Wood avens, willow herb (rosebay and broad-leaved), water mint

Yellow archangel, yellow pimpernel

Farm News

Lovely sunshine! And no, we don't need rain. Except for those fields of maize just the other side of the main road, so some for there please, but not on the asparagus.

Not too much to ask is it?

In the winter I talked about the importance of looking after the soil structure, the benefits become apparent now in a dry time as plant roots in well structured soil will reach down deep into the moisture. Wheat yields are largely decided by the sunshine levels we get in the long days of June and July, so no weeks of dull overcast wet days please.

Maize is an interesting one, it's typically a hot and dry climate sort of crop with a root system that goes quite deep in search of moisture. In addition it's leaf layout has a rather clever design; look carefully and you'll notice they are arranged like an upside down umbrella, funnelling any dew and rain down to the roots.
